

Lesson 6: Periodic Expenses

Topic: Periodic Expenses	Class: 3rd Grade		
Content Objective: Students will learn the concept of periodic expenses and compare to fixes and variable expenses.	Key Vocabulary: Bills, Budget, Expense, Fixed Expense, Variable Expense, Periodic Expense, Wants, Needs

Part 4: Video Quiz (Optional) 1. This optional 3 question quiz will assess the understanding of the concepts in the video. You Quiz: Budget and Periodic Expenses can use this to help guide your questions https://forms.gle/GL1BLU6ukrtaGAis5 following the video with your students. Part 5: Group Activity 1. Present the Google Slide or printable G3-L6-IC-Virtual worksheet to the students. As a class or in groups, have students decide which of the G3-L6-IC-Print items at the bottom are periodic expenses. Move the pictures to the periodic expenses box and discuss why they fit in that category. Discuss with your students how periodic expenses are typically "wants" and how much you can spend depends on how fits in the budget. i.e.- you may "want" an expensive game console, but you only have enough money left in the budget in order to afford the birthday gift for your grandma this month. Prioritizing "wants" with things that come up only once in a while is still important in putting together a budget! Part 6: Practice Assignment 1.
